

Women's Entrepreneurship in Pakistan: Barriers, Family Support, and Entrepreneurial Education in the Context of Islamabad

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Abstract

Entrepreneurship plays a transformative role in economic advancement and social progress. Within developing countries, however, women's entrepreneurial participation often faces structural, cultural, and institutional barriers. This study examines the barriers to women's entrepreneurial aspirations in Islamabad, Pakistan, where empirical assessment of such challenges has been limited. Drawing on survey data and employing multiple regression analysis, the study identifies three major constraints: insufficient family support, lack of entrepreneurial training, and inadequate entrepreneurship education. The findings reveal that family support exerts the strongest influence on entrepreneurial inclination, followed by entrepreneurial training, while entrepreneurship education remains a secondary but significant factor. The study underscores that familial endorsement is not only essential for women's confidence but also for their access to financial, emotional, and social resources. Limitations include the geographic scope (Islamabad only) and the cross-sectional nature of the data. The research contributes to the growing discourse on gendered entrepreneurship by offering insights for policymakers, educators, and community stakeholders on fostering supportive ecosystems for women entrepreneurs. Practical recommendations highlight the importance of strengthening training programs, designing gender-sensitive curricula, and cultivating family and societal support systems to unlock women's entrepreneurial potential in Pakistan.

1.0 Introduction

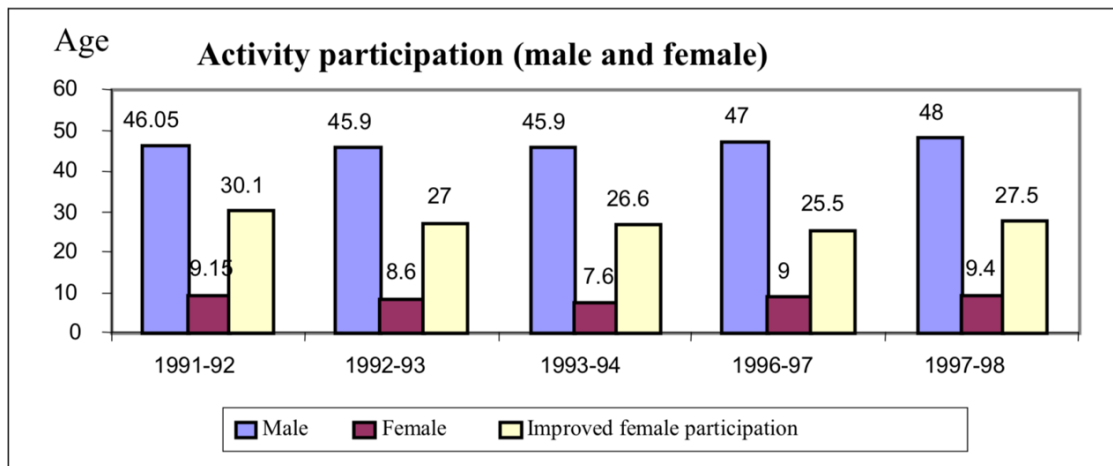

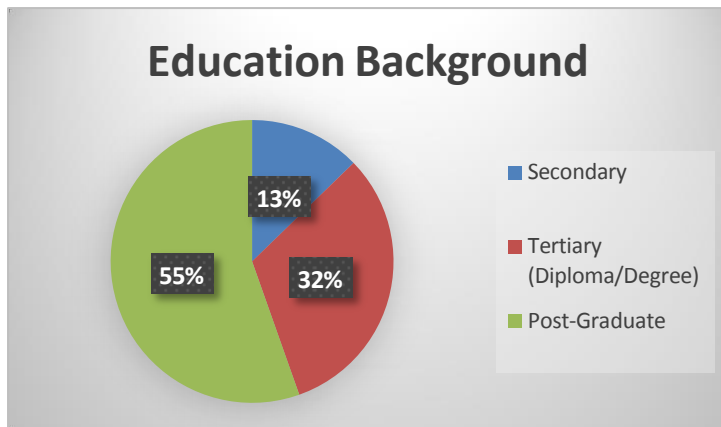

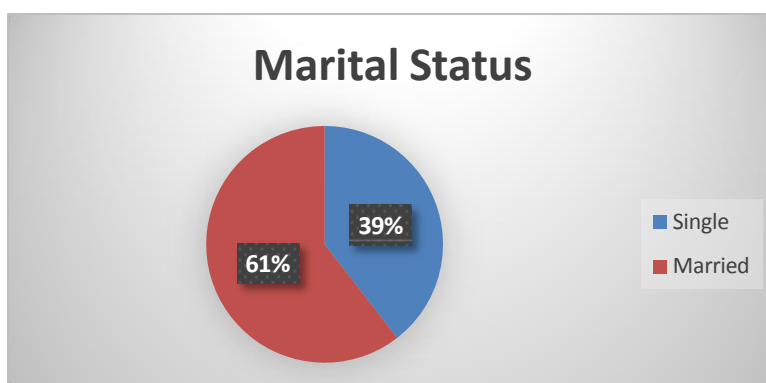
